#### **From The**

Dear Friends,

In 2007 the Sisters of Mercy were sued for damages done to public land, which is the playground of St. Catherine's Primary School, and was grabbed in 1994 and then sold to NSSF (*National Social Security Fund*) who then engaged an agent to sell it to others. The case is coming up for a hearing on 1<sup>st</sup> of March thus time was spent with the lawyer preparing to be a witness in the case.

An orphan, Ivan Obade (Evans) was diagnosed in September 2018, with leukaemia. His specialist, Professor Mwonda, recommended bone marrow transplant as the cancer is still present after eight courses of chemotherapy. The transplant cannot be done in Kenya. We have attempted to find his sibling, but so far have not been successful. His passport is being processed. If a donor is found to pay and a bone marrow match is found, he will travel for bone marrow transplant. Another orphan, Steve, who is also HIV positive, became very sick and had to be hospitalised. He is now stable and is an intern in a company.

Klaus Zeugner, a photographer, visited from Austria, to record the work being done by MPC and supported by DKA Austria. He agreed to mentor Winnie Ogutu, a new employee in image recording, which is building our capacity to produce clearer photographs. I was very happy to see the primary school pupil, Asker, who gave birth just before her final primary exam, settled into Form One in St Michael's.

We realise we have two major challenges facing us now, 1) increase our fundraising capacity 2) build up our Child Protection Office to ensure childrens' safety.

Sr. Kathy and I were very happy to visit the Ruben Centre, which was founded by the Sisters of Mercy and run by us for ten years. It was great to see the development work going on there by the Christian Brothers from Australia.

We have been networking to see how to improve mental health care in the project and within our Clinic.

The Mater Misericordiae hospital is willing to partner with us on training the unemployed youth, such as catering, office workers, domestic workers as well as security. We are also discussing the possibility of selling water from our bore hole to service some of the needs at the hospital which could generate some income for MPC. February has been a very full month and we trust that the new activities and partnerships will continue.

#### **Social Services:**

The social services department was involved in various activities and the majority was focused on the children. The children from the schools were given medical attention with chronic and emergency cases being given priority. The first fire outbreak in Maasai village and some of the victims were given assistance through the social office and within 2 days another fire occurred and then another one 4 days later. Our donor has kindly stepped in to assist hundreds of families through Sr Barbara and the St Catherine's social office.

#### **Our Lady of Mercy Vocational Training Centre**

The Centre received its NITA (National Industrial Training Authority) accreditation for two more trade courses at the centre being sign writing and painter decorator trade courses. The monthly celebration of mass at the training centre has stabilized since its introduction last year in September many students attended mass in the hall which was at capacity.

#### Songa Mbele Na Masomo

The centre reintroduced the Home program for parents so that the physiotherapy procedures they learn at the centre can be continued at home for their children. This has greatly improved the response of the children and has improved their overall wellbeing.

This month the daily attendance for the coaching unit and the special daycare increased with an average attendance of 84%. The special daycare had 21 children, special coaching unit had 24 children and the coaching unit 28 children. All delighted to be at Songa.

We were grateful to the visitors who came and spent time with the children during the day as well as their thoughtful donations of food and clothing. Many of them stayed to help out with the lunchtime feeding program.

Some of the interventions and activities undertaken by Songa during the month:

#### **Mary Immaculate Rehabilitation Centre**

The recruitment of new boys for the 2019 program continued and now we have 38 boys ready to go through the program. Their next step is a medical checkup which is conducted by our medical staff at the Clinic. The boys have settled into their classes which are divided into three categories based on the boy's ability and capability: Primary 1, Primary 2 and Carpentry class.

Four boys from the 2018 group were referred to Mwangaza Rehabilitation Centre for further rehabilitation before being reintegrated to school and their families. The Centre welcomed them well and we are hopeful that they will finish the process well and make good decisions about their futures.

Several groups of visitors came to the Centre and had fun times interacting with the boys. They took time to talk to them about various issues and gave donations to help the boys during the process.

The boys also had an art workshop this month with Paula Cullen and her group. This is one of the extracurricular activities that the boys are engaged in to help them build their creative side as well as keep them busy. Paula and her group also provided all the new uniforms, shoes, shirts, jumpers and other casual wear for the boys. The boys scrubbed up well the next day for formal classes.

#### **Primary Schools:**

The schools' enrolment continued. The increase is associated with a private donor who has been supporting the school lunches for a number of years. The enrolment numbers are shown below.

There is a big challenge with the teacher/pupil ratio as we have not yet received replacement teachers from the TSC (Teachers Service Commission). Several of our teachers were transferred at the beginning of the year as part of a government promise to provide secondary transition to pupils. The country needs another 33,000 teachers to fill the positions. We can only continue with our lobbying the TSC and the Education Ministry and keep hoping that they will send us teachers or support the teachers that we employ to reduce the ratio to a more conducive level for sound education.

The KCPE registration was done and currently we have 660 pupils from the four schools who will sit for the exams in 2019. There were difficulties obtaining the necessary documents needed for the registration, especially the birth certificates. Unfortunately, we have had fires in the villages which consumed the victims earthly possessions and documents. There were some parents who submitted fake birth certificates and the consequence is deregistration. It is not an easy process but we have the social workers in the different schools trying to obtain the certificates with the help of the children office.

#### **ESTABLISHMENT OF MPC**

**Mukuru Promotion Centre** was established in May **1985** as a non-formal school with 45 pioneer pupils. Four untrained teachers who had received some teaching methods from teachers at Our Lady of Mercy Primary School conducted 4 main classes. It was a project of **Sisters of Mercy (Kenya)**.

The Centre was established as a result of the growing number of children who had to drop out of school because their parents could not afford fees being demanded for building extra classrooms. A group of concerned parents approached the government and various church bodies asking for some provisions to be made to help keep their children off the street, resulting in Sisters of Mercy responding to this appeal by establishing MPC. The school which served as a church on Sundays consisted of a large hall divided into four classrooms by cartons. It was jointly funded by the Sisters of Mercy (Ireland) through **Sr. Cora** and **The Missionaries of Africa** through **Fr. Manuel. Sr. Mary Killeen** who was the Head Teacher of Our Lady of Mercy (OLM) Primary School collaborated with Fr. Manuel to establish the school and so they are recognised as the co-founders of MPC.

In 1987 female students who qualified to undertake secondary education went to Our Lady of Mercy Secondary school while the male students went to Highway Secondary School. The dressmaking classes were moved to Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish Centre (OLQP) for students who did not proceed to secondary school after it was found that the machines could not be left safely in temporary buildings. On the school compound, boys joined carpentry and masonry classes in rooms built by Fr McFarren, a Salesian Father. The tools were brought in a huge chest and returned to each afternoon to the Salesian in Karen.

**In 1990,** pupils of Mukuru Primary (Kayaba village) sat for the first KCPE examination. Two streams were started from class one to eight and Mr Raja of Crown Industries donated maize and beans for the students lunch before world food programme (WFP) commenced in 1993.

In 1991, A German priest Fr. Rakyl requested assistance to run a school in Lunga Lunga. This led to the establishment of St Elizabeth's school under the auspices of MPC.

In addition, NSSF donated two adjoining acres where the Vocational Training Centre is currently.

**In 1992**, MPC acquired 5 acres of land opposite Express Kenya a land which was former quarry and dumpsite.

A general election was held and tribal clashes saw a huge influx of Boranas from North Eastern and Kikuyus from Moro to Kayaba slums. Many of their children went to St. Catherine's and MPC built a house for some of them.

In 1995, Blessed Josephine Bakhita Primary School was opened to try and accommodate some of the children from the slums due to mammoth increase in numbers in population. The parents wanted to call the school after Cardinal Otunga but the Cardinal directed the school to be named after the newly beatified Sudanese Woman.

**In 1996,** Mary Immaculate Rehabilitation centre was opened as a special drop-in centre. Kayaba clinic, currently known as Mary Immaculate Clinic (MIC) was moved to St Bakhita from Crown Industries and formally opened by **Lion Ushah Shah** on 21<sup>st</sup> February.

In **1999**, the Clinic moved to St. Catherine's site for security reasons. Sr. Patricia O'Meara succeeded Sr. Mary Killeen as MPC Director, September 1999. Sr. Kathleen Rooney took over in June 2001.

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On Sunday 10th March we were out celebrating Sr Patricia's birthday when the news came through that there had been an Ethiopian Airlines plane accident where 157 people lost their lives. At the time we didn't make the connection. When we returned in the evening the tragic news of flight ET302 was even more traumatic when Sr Mary received the news. Danica Olexova, a project manager for eRko Slovakia (Christian Children's Communities Movement) was on the flight. Danica was scheduled to meet with us on the Monday morning at the Head Office and then again during the week with the Songa Mbele na Masomo staff. We have all been in shock.

Danica has been assisting our staff for the last 4 years and we meet a couple of times a year. She was a passionate woman who worked tirelessly for the marginalised in Kenya and Ethiopia. Danica was tenacious and committed to finding the best possible outcomes for people. She lived in Nairobi for 3 years working at the DKA Support Office, conducting monitoring and evaluation support to projects in Kenya. After the closure of the DKA Support Office at the end of 2015 Danica worked for eRko Slovakia where she continued her work in monitoring and evaluation of projects. Danica will be sadly missed by scores of people not only in Kenya and Ethiopia but in her own country, Slovakia. Our prayers and condolences to her family.



God, we commend to you our friend and colleague, Danica. May she enjoy your presence and your love for all eternity.
