Dear Partners, Supporters and Friends,

I travelled to Ireland on 2nd June and was very happy to meet with immediate family and catch up with some Sisters of Mercy and friends. Sadly, I could not meet everyone I would like due to time and CoVid19, as a number of people had to isolate. Thanks to the Mater Community for hosting me.

I was happy to meet the Calary Congregation and their new young, energetic pastor. I was fortunate and happy to also meet Rev Bennett the former pastor who welcomed me to Calary many years ago. Paula Cullen and friends held a fundraiser for the work in the Rehabilitation Centre and for the proposed new dining hall. It was very well attended and I noticed a number of Calary congregants in the crowd and friends, relatives and neighbours of the Cullens. Thanks to all who supported the event.

I attended another fundraiser in Rome organised by Breana Stillman. Breana visited Mukuru twice with some of her colleagues and noticed that we did not have a piano or good keyboard. She hopes to get the funds to buy one for the Centre. Thanks to her and to her colleagues who donated their services for the marvellous concert. The leaders of the Christian Brothers, based in Rome, turned up in support.

On my return to Mukuru I saw that the work was going on steadily in all the departments. Dinah Maina, Deputy Director was very busy with the daily tasks of administering the Centre and preparing for the opening of Songa Mbele in July. I saw that Sr Louise and the boys, together with Reinhard, had constructed a new shelter for chickens further away from the kitchen and dining hall. I was sorry to miss Caroline Cullen and her group who visited while I was away and managed to do some work in Rehabilitation and treated children of Songa Mbele to a fun day. Thanks to them and to the various local donors.

With the increasing poverty it is hard to keep the children in school and college. Everything is increasing in price but income is less or the same as before. We have a number of children with serious health challenges whose parents have no income. In Kenya to be treated you have to pay first. It is an increasing challenge to pay for hospitalisation of children and destitute parents. I am most grateful to those who help out here. Some of the children, through your help, have been saved from going blind after an eye accident, or from death by having a necessary operation. Dr Monika, who worked for months in the Clinic, returned for a visit. I regretted very much not seeing her. She has supported St Catherine's Primary School with agriculture, poultry and sheep projects during her time with us. We miss her a lot.

Congratulations to Malcolm and Margaret Savage who funded the Kerrigan Cup for years. This brings great joy and excitement to the schools, as they compete with one another. Sr Lilian and Catherine Karuno conducted the Child Protection Training with staff, surrounding Mukuru community and local leaders. It reminds us of all of our duty of care towards children. Thanks to Sr Lilian and her team for this great work done with support of the Sisters of Mercy.

We are trying to renew and develop our vocational training courses. The youth we want to train often do not have the means to pay for their training. Our facilities for hair dressing and catering urgently need expansion. Our furniture, fittings and equipment need upgrading in many sections. Chantal Goetz from the FGF Foundation has contributed much towards this development.

May we improve the training and job opportunities. It is a challenge to deal with students from different levels of education. We integrated pasts students of Songa Mbele and other special units as they too need training in order to earn their living. We still have to equip the classrooms.

May we continue to alleviate the poverty we find. Best wishes and prayers

A former pupil of St Bakhita Primary School, Kule was helped by the Sisters of Mercy when a child due to her situation. Under the sponsorship program, MPC sent her to secondary school where Eugene took up the payment of fees and sponsored her in her first degree in law school. She has been working in human rights and prosecution for three years of pedophiles in Kenya since graduating.

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The teachers are working hard to ensure that at least the boys who were recruited in April are at par with the other boys. The boys in Year One are able to speak simple words and read in both Kiswahili and English. Most of the new boys struggle to read and write. Some of them can do simple Maths like addition, subtraction, multiplication. The youngest boy 7 years has greatly improved and is developing his confidence.

Year Two class has 7 boys attending Grade 7 and 5 that are just below the standard average. Some still find reading, comprehension and writing challenging but the Maths is much better. The good aspect is that they are positive about learning which goes a long way on the journey for achievement.



The Pro Futuro tablets continue to provide motivation for all the boys. The digital platform has many options for learning and the boys really enjoy the fun activities. The teachers also continue their proficiency with the tablets through the fortnightly training sessions.

The current carpentry class project is making picture frames and saloon mirrors for the Our Lady of Mercy Vocational Training Centre. The students have learnt how to use router machines to create patterns on the frames, cut different shapes, create designs using jigsaws, combined planer, circular saws, and ambital sanders. The exams were held and the boys showed great concentration. Derrick Gibnja, Dennis Owino and Simon Wekesa scored the highest marks. Seven boys have commenced their industrial placements. MPC is grateful to the companies who help develop their skills in the workplace. Companies such as Zablon, Exotic Crafts, Antique Furniture International and Timber workshops.

Extra-Curricular activities such as rugby, gymnastics and dancing keep the boys active after their daily lessons. Cultivation, weeding and transplanting kales seedings and propping tomatoes gives an earthy feel to the other exercises.

**THE FARM PROJECT**: The Brothers and Sisters in Need project has begun in earnest. The activity in the project involves erecting the shade cloth for the chickens and the vegetables on the farm. The boys with the guidance from teachers have been actively working on the farm to ensure that the crops are monitored well. The first lot of vegetables grown were peas and the next crop will be Kales.

The Day of the African Child is set aside each year to celebrate the lives of those children who lost their lives in South Africa on 16<sup>th</sup> June 1971 when the Police unleashed gunfire on them as they were protesting because they wanted to be taught in their native language. The theme for 2022 was "Eliminating Harmful Practices Affecting"

**Children".** One example of this is when society was taught not to tolerate or legally permit child marriages, denial of education, or

other human rights abuses of children. All children are entitled to better education and care. The boys took part in the celebrations held at Shauri Moyo in Nairobi. They were taught about their rights and responsibilities as young citizens of Kenya.



Proposed Design




### Sponsorship Office


St Catherine pupils write their Appreciation Letters



MPC continues to explore with local companies the possibility of empowering young lives through sponsorships and mentorships. We hope to provide more information after engaging with a few organizations in June.

### Songa Mbele na Masomo Children's Centre

We remember one of the Day Care children who died during the month with flu. Mark Kaunda was 9 year of age. The enrolments continue to increase, currently the children number 84 with a 60/40 ratio with 23 staff members. There are also other children who are able to connect with the therapy sessions as outside clients. The volunteers who visit the Centre during the month are very much appreciated with their commitment, enthusiasm and creativity. Volunteers from Rafa Home Care, United States International University, Sisters of Mercy, Missionaries of Africa Sisters. Some volunteers come for a few days, others carry out a community service placement for a couple of months.



The two therapists at the Centre treat the enrolled (58) as well as the 'outside' (13) children. The physiotherapist focuses on the muscle strength and the occupational therapist develops the gross



motor activities for the children. The overall individual plan for each child is a combination with the teachers, social workers, counsellors and nutritionist. Each child is always given a 45 minute session depending on the child's disability. Given the severity of the disability the bulk of the sessions are exercised with those children in the Day Care Unit and Unit 1. The parents are also encouraged to part take in the exercises so that they can ensure that the child's therapy remains consistent over the weekends and public holidays.

One big success for the months is Stephen Macharia from Unit 1 who can now walk with a little help using the walking aid.

Ongoing training is a critical ingredient for the children reaching their

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milestones. For a good number of years Songa Mbele has provided the Sign Language training for children, staff and parents. Facilitator Emmy Akinyi led the 4 teachers, 28 parents, caregivers and children through the basics of sign language. They were also taught how to finger spell their names and greet people.

## Social and Health Services Social Services

The social workers in various offices have been working to ensure that students are in school and continue with their studies. With the odds stacked against many students from the slums it is very important that the social workers provide the best possible support for the students. Hence, a number of 'at risk students' are receiving counselling.

One practical support furnished through the Child Protection Office was the girls were trained in some self-defense and self -awareness tactics. The Umoja Karate Group took the girls through the theory and practical aspects ranging from primary pupils to Our Lady of Mercy Vocational Training Centre.

With the pandemic still on, there have been challenges ensuring the students are safe and following the guidelines set by the Ministry of Health on CoVid19 protocols. Most of the children we serve come from underprivileged families whereby priority is given to the basic needs and not really their health. We are grateful to have received face masks and hand sanitizers which were issued to our students to use them.

The June inflation rate is 7.9% which is up .08% from the previous month. The Kenya economy has rendered most of the vulnerable groups to abject poverty and unable to fend for themselves. A great number of our families who fall into this category have been greatly affected. Most of them are unable to afford food due to hiked food prices. Through our various social offices, we received generous donations of food, clothing, school uniforms, resources, educational materials and shoes that have been issued to needy students and families. MPC is deeply appreciative to all donors for their generosity during the difficult month as it has helped to uphold people's human dignity.

The student profiling work continues as people's situations change quickly. The social workers are in and out of the schools and making home assessments so that families can be helped. It is important to identify who needs real assistance as quickly as possible to determine each person's status. Relieving the economic burdens from families provides stability for the families.

### **MPC Clinic**

Over the month of June there was a 10% increase in patients with record high numbers of sick pupils from MPC schools with St. Catherine and Sancta Maria Kayaaba Primary Schools having the highest numbers. Many of them had similar symptoms of fever, sore throat, headache and running stomach. Because of the Clinic the residents of Mukuru slums can access some form of health care and those with more serious ailments can be referred to other medical institutions. Most of the Clinic is subsidized through overseas agencies which allows people to be treated. Expectedly, the cold season has given rise to respiratory infections.



The Ministry of Health continues to assist with the Clinic with the supervision of the TB program. The Clinic was advised by the MOH to develop two more steps in the programs: 1) Introduction of IGRA (Interferon gamma release assay) test for all TB household contacts before introduction of TB preventive therapy; 2) pediatric formulation for the TB infected children. The MOH provided training for the staff on the IGRA which involves diagnosis, testing of TB before initiation of preventive therapy (Active Tuberculosis Preventive Therapy).

Dr Monika Palockova from Slovakia has volunteered at the Clinic for 12 months while conducting some research titled 'Antibotic resistance of isolated uropatheogens of uncomplicated urinary tract

infections in populations of Mukuru slums, Nairobi, Kenya'. Dr Monika Palockova and Mr Frantisec Podmanicky from Banska Bystrica, Slovakia presented the findings from the research. One of the major findings was that the Escherichia Coli bacteria was found to be the most common cause of UTIs in Mukuru. The two medications used to treat UTIs, Nitrofurantoin and Ciprofloxacin were found to be the most sensitive antibiotics for treatment while Co-trimoxazole was found to be resistant in treatment of UTIs.

# Education Primary Schools

The condensed school terms pose a challenge for teachers especially to ensure that the syllabus is covered before the holiday break. This fast pace is not ideal for pupils as it does not provide for indepth learning. Eventually, inadequate teaching time will create frustration for the pupils. Rushing curriculum is never good for anyone but we hope that the desire to learn is greater than attendance by the pupils.

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St Michael's Secondary School is always trying to find new ways and programs that will assist students to maximize their experiences while attending secondary school. The "Boys 2 Men" program offers mentorship for the boys aged between 14 – 18. The program consists of group activities, one-on-one mentoring, motivational talks, with a focus on overall development towards adulthood. Some of the topics involve: academic success, career goals, leadership, peer pressure, sex education, emotional intelligence, drugs, faith and respect for women. Everyone has the capacity to be shaped and molded into an even better human person.

St Michael's has been partnering with Strathmore University's Macheo program since 2016. The results have been beneficial for students, school and university. All students in a Form group sit for the examinations. Once the 20 students have been selected based on the examination performance, they are invited to participate in the program that takes place on Saturdays for 4 hours. The program cycle has a number of subjects which changes each Saturday. The subjects include Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Kiswahili, Mathematics and English. The teachers also receive professional development training in their subject areas such as Physics and Chemistry. The previous Macheo group 2021 KCSE results produced several Cs which allows them to gain entrance into a tertiary education institution.

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The computer packages classes are very popular. There is always the challenge of not enough computers and hence the need to have multiple classes in the day. The computer lab has 17 fully functional computers against 30-40 students. Currently students are sharing computers at the ratio of at least 3 learners per unit. In a bid to address the challenge, the Centre has already initiated the process of buying teaching materials which include 12 additional computers, UPSs and a data projector. We hope that the items will be delivered by the time the students start their exams.

The Dressmaking class has covered the introduction of the course, tools and equipment in garment making, stitches, garment details and embroidery. The students can now operate a sewing machine both manual and industrial. The students have a filing system of keeping records of what they learn and stitch in class. The class work will be kept for future reference. According to the new curriculum from the National Industrial Training Authority (NITA), the teacher has divided the students into 2 groups: Class Eight and Form Four (secondary) dropouts. Despite the different levels of education, both groups are making much progress.
