It is very encouraging for us to receive support from Sisters as far away as Australia and occasionally from the US. Of course, there are a few Sisters from Ireland who support regularly as well as Mercy Solidarity and some of the Provinces. It is good you know what this help means to us, the knowledge that we are in this work together, that we are not struggling alone. Thanks for that.

On September 1st, we received a retired Spanish manager of companies, Antonio Alvarez. He offered his considerable expertise to enhance the overall management by working one on one with each of the Heads of Department. He is currently assisting the HODs to engage staff, to identify appropriate actions, to achieve the strategic plan objectives in each department. It is great to have his help. Normally consultants do not have enough time to really develop the understanding of middle management. We are grateful to Antonio.

A short video clip of Mr Colm Brophy TD, Minister of State for the Diaspora and Development, visiting Songa Mbele, was shown on RTE news. He was highlighting hunger in the Horn of Africa. After viewing this news clip, Irene Plunkett raised more than €4,000 for those who suffer from extreme hunger. Mrs S Thatthi, my former deputy, in Our Lady of Mercy Primary School, invites me for lunch once a term and gives a donation for sponsorship. She is now in her mid-eighties. It is wonderful to see her keen interest and care.

Crew members of British Airways continue to assist with goods. They help with clothes for fire victims, hairdressing and beauty materials, fabric and patterns for sewing, washable toys and educational material for the youths with disabilities and art

materials. We appreciate as students do not have the means to buy the materials needed for practice. People of short stature (dwarf) have a hard time here due to the belief in witchcraft and curses. Many end up dying of drink. I am happy to note that two of them, whom some of you supported, Daudi and Martin, have become steadier and are doing well. Daudi is now working as a gardener at Songa Mbele na Masomo and Martin just completed his second year of high school.

We are appreciative and thankful to Mater Misericordiae Hospital Nairobi, CEO, Sr Maria Ngui, for the donation of 20 used computers. Our secondary and front office students needed them urgently.

We opened Tenders and chose the contractor for the building of the new dining room for the street boys. Thanks to Paula Cullen, Irene Plunkett, Catherine Nolan, Vera Smith, Adrienne Keeley, Theresa ??, Claire Chambers, Calary Congregation, and their families and friends for this initiative. We also thank people who responded to the appeal that we placed in previous newsletters.

Ministry of Health staff visited and threatened to close our Clinic due to dilapidated conditions. They gave us two weeks to renovate our laboratory. We quickly responded with temporary measures but we hope to build a permanent Clinic one day. The Clinic is a wooden structure that is over 25 years old. Meanwhile, all Departments and activities went on well.

To see at least five past pupils of the Rehabilitation Centre in college and about fifty in secondary school is very satisfying. May God bless our donors as the students could not reach this stage without you. Trocaire assisted some parents of children in rehabilitation to set up small businesses in order to support their children and not have them on the streets. Thank you to the Mercy Education Office for the celebration of Mercy Day with representatives of all schools attending Mass and entertainment with refreshments.

May we work together to alleviate poverty.

Rehabilitation Centre

During the month of September 5 more boys commenced their rehabilitation at the Centre which takes the total number to 66 for the month. The accelerated learning class has 34 students; St Catherine's Primary School has 14 students while 15 attend the carpentry course and a further 3 boys are enrolled in secondary school.

It would seem incredulous that after a disruptive August, schools across the country were given a break in September. The teachers proceeded with teaching and tried to cover the workload as per

the curriculum with a very turbulent previous month.

The Grade 3 boys completed the CBC assessments and performed very well with the fun activities such as dancing, singing and playing musical instruments. They also had to wear costumes that they made with a little help from their teachers. The objective for the assessment was to be very creative and colourful. The day wasn't all fun as the serious side required them to sit the traditional test in class.



While the primary and secondary schools closed for a week's break in September, it also marked the beginning of a new semester for the tertiary students. The sponsored students have written their appreciation letters to their donors and the school reports were collected to inform the donors on the student's academic progress.



For children from the slums to reach university / tertiary level education is a mighty mammoth effort. Generous people from many parts of the world have enabled this to happen. Recently there were 4 sponsored students who finally reached this amazing milestone. James Kamau will commence a bachelor's degree in Computer Science and Mathematics at Muranga University, thanks to Paula Cullen and Friends; Dennis Ongango will study Electrical Engineering at Nairobi Technical College thanks to Beverly Cheresem; Edward Mokua and Emmanuel Wekesa will study at Masinde Muliro University and at Kirinyaga University; Simon Mwangi will attend Kirinyaga University thanks to the Raja Charitable Trust Foundation.

During the holiday breaks the Office organizes sensitization days or mentorship sessions for the sponsored students. The guest speaker for September was a former sponsored student of St Michael's, Dennis Otieno. Dennis graduated in March 2022 with first class honours in a Bachelor of Science and Microbiology from Eldoret University. Dennis was sponsored by Jim and Lorin Morvich.

Returning to his high school provided much uplifting encouragement for the students at St Michael's. Dennis' advice to the students was to remain positive and concentrate on improving their weak subjects especially sciences and mathematics, which seem to challenge many of the students.


Through the support from donors, MPC endeavors to uphold the dignity of the very vulnerable in society, one particular group in society is former prisoners. An entrepreneurship skills workshop was conducted with the identified 10 women and 2 men with diverse talents in art and painting to start their own small businesses. It is hoped that they will be able to earn a decent livelihood. Also, plans are underway to empower 10 young women



who recently graduated from Our Lady of Mercy Vocational Training Centre. These single mothers are the best performers. We propose to purchase some working tools that will enable them to advance their skills in hairdressing/beauty, dress making and plumbing. We thank the donors for their commitment in offering opportunities to the marginalized.

Songa Mbele na Masomo Children's Centre

September was a beehive of activities that included many visitors from various schools and institutions such as the British Airways crewmembers, Evergreen Christian group, Kenya Kids and CBC Highschool. The total number of children enrolled at the Centre is now 90 including 1 new 4 year old child with autism, Calvin Nyakundi.



Each of the Units at the Centre are assisted with caregivers and university students on placement from RAFA Homecare College. All children received therapy sessions to improve their various levels of mobility. The Centre has the capacity to conduct 12 sessions a month for each child. In September 20 children managed 10 sessions or more with 62% being males and 38% being females.

From the Daycare Unit, Maxwell who has cerebral palsy showed great improvement. He was admitted in February 2021 when he was 4 years old with hypertonic muscle tone of both upper and lower extremities. Maxwell had little head control, trunk stability, walking ability as well as no facial expressions. He was unable to play with toys and had limited speech but after continuous therapy Maxwell can now smile, weight bear on his elbows independently and sit with assistance. His hypertonicity has reduced and he enjoys partial trunk stability, making cooing sounds as he reaches for the toys. This is a great experience for the parents to see their child striving to achieve the basics.

The Sisters of Mercy around the world celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Mercy in September. Many Mercy institutions around the globe would have a focus on outreach as an expression of Mercy especially to the poor. Staff members from the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, Nairobi visited the children at Songa and distributed items such as assistive devices, food provisions and bead bungles. The hospital also committed to send a physiotherapist once a week to assist with the training and programs.

The social workers conducted 16 home visits to assess the progress of children who are sponsored to other disabilities institutions in different counties. It was noted in reports that there was a decline in some of their academic performances. After meetings with teachers and parents it was agreed to combine efforts to ensure the children study harder.

Several meetings and workshops were held in September. The Cheshire Disabilities Services Kenya (CDSK) held 2 engagement forums targeting Parents and Boys on Adolescent Reproductive Health Rights and Services. Over 20 parents and 20 boys were led through an empowerment process to raise and talk about sex and sexuality without feeling shame as well as gender based violence prevention. The other workshops held were the Kenya Sign Language course and Disability Awareness.

Social and Health Services Social Services

During September, the Department saw an increase in the number of clients who came to seek assistance in the various social offices across our institutions. With the hard economic times, most people are unable to afford basic necessities, hence depend on MPC services to keep going. With many clients seeking nutritional support St. Catherine's Social Office plays a significant role to ensure that they receive this support with whatever is available. The Amaranth program has been very instrumental in making sure the chronically ill clients get a weekly nutritional package to boost their immune system.

With the school academic year almost ending, there have been various activities in regard to student follow ups. We recorded an increased number of absenteeism cases from our schools due to various factors ranging from family issues to a lack of access to basic needs, illnesses and truancy. The Child Protection Office, in collaboration with the social workers played a significant role in ensuring the students receive some form of mentorship as well as guidance and counselling. The sessions help provide tools to reduce anti-social behavior in our institutions and also provide other forms of support.

MPC partners and donors enable the Department to serve the children and families in our institutions as well as other community members. The recent clothes donation went directly to the fire victims and their families. Come and meet some of the hundreds of people who were assisted in September.

The various treatments and clinics continued throughout September. There was a slight increase in the number of patients treated in the month with 30% percentage of children under the age of 5 having respiratory issues followed by 80% of people in the Cardiovascular disease category with Septicaemia which is nearly double the statistics in August.

Education Primary Schools

September marked the end of term 2 and the start of term 3. The primary school enrolments have remained constant, however, the number of teachers decreased placing further stress on the pupils. The rate of absenteeism increased as a few children spend time roaming in the slums with no clear reasons for being absent or with claims of sickness.

Out of the 4 MPC primary schools, the ones with the highest number of teacher shortages are St Catherine and St. Bakhita. A high ratio certainly impacts negatively on learning and teacher delivery. All the primary schools are well above the recommended Teacher's Service Commission ratio of 1:50.

Whilst MPC welcomes the deployment of new teachers at its primary schools, the gap still remains. St Bakhita did receive 2 new teachers and St Elizabeth received 1. St Catherine's and Sancta Maria Kayaaba did not receive any.

The Sub-County ball games were carried out during September. The 6 best boy players were selected to form a County team and among them was 1 boy from St. Catherine's and 5 boys from St. Bakhita. The team went to Machakos County for a 5-day tournament where they played against other Counties. The winners then proceeded to the National level matches. Nairobi County team lost to Kajiado County.

Our Lady of Mercy Vocational Training Centre

The Vocational Training Centre had a full workload in September to make sure that the adjusted syllabus and practicals were completed without any further disruptions.

MPC is delighted to be partnering with the Fidel Goetz Foundation to develop and implement innovative strategies for gender equality and social justice. The Foundation's goal is to empower young women professionally and economically so that they can engage in global leadership roles. The Foundation has sponsored 50 former female students from St. Michael's Secondary School in vocational training courses and participate in the mentorship program. Chantal Goetz visited OLMVTC in September to personally meet each of the participants.

A professional communications school called Linz, Austria and OLMVTC have teamed up together for a video project. The project is titled "Don't mess with my rights" and will focus on children's rights and violations and what can be done to improve the current situation. The 16 students are divided into groups of 4 and meet every Tuesday through zoom. The violation of human rights and other issues are discussed in the 2 hour forums. The main objective is to raise awareness of children's rights and see how best to strengthen practices. The 4 groups are expected to produce a music video, documentary or fiction film that will be shown in December 2022 at "This Human World" film festival in Vienna and in Linz Upper Austria.
